Abstract: Autocratic regimes used to rely heavily on violent repression and other coercive measures to deter rebellion. More recently, the development of Information Communicative Technology (ICT) provides autocratic regimes with new tools which can be actively used to serve certain regime functions. However, ICT has also brought new challenges to autocracies because internet and social media may make mobilization easier. Does ICT help autocratic regimes to deter rebellion? I argue that autocratic regimes use information manipulation strategies through ICT to either lower people's motivation for rebellion by altering individual preferences between status quo and social change or make mass mobilization more difficult by intervening free information flow and thereafter the coordination process among citizens. This research explores three autocratic strategies: censorship, limited government transparency, and propaganda, and whether/how these strategies deter rebellion.
